Twelve Generations of Service

When my son, Samuel, was eight years old, he was inspired by an Army National Guard officer who spoke at his Trail Life troop meeting. At the time, I thought my son's excitement was strictly a result of the goodie bag containing a U.S. Army winter hat, lanyard, and other Army items. It was only recently that I learned from my son, now 13 and still wearing the hat, that he was so inspired by that presentation that he is interested in joining the Army. Samuel has shown the self-discipline it would take to be a soldier with regular work outs and trying to eat healthy food. To further assist his goals and help him develop his combat skills, I enrolled him and his younger sister in Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu (BJJ). BJJ is one of the most effective martial arts, and we happen to live near one of the best BJJ gyms in the Midwest. Once the pandemic began, we set up a gym in our basement and streamed classes over Zoom. Samuel and his sister have faithfully participated in multiple Zoom classes per week for many months, and as a result, they have both been promoted in rank to gray belts with white stripes.

Whether Samuel pursues military service or not, it is important that he understands that he comes from a long line of ancestors who served their country. What follows is a description of the service of twelve generations of his ancestors.



Gen 1: Ensign Christopher Willard Moberg

NOAA (7 Jan 1992 – 13 Mar 1992)

After college, I joined the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The first two months of land-based basic officer training at Ft. Eustis, Virginia went very well. The final month of the three-month program was sea training, and I found that I could not sleep aboard a ship. For this reason, I was honorably discharged. While my involvement with NOAA was brief, it was enough to qualify me for the Naval Order of the United States.



Gen 2: Specialist Robert Walter Moberg

U. S. Army (23 Sep 1960 – 21 Sep 1962)

My father was drafted into the U.S. Army before he was able to complete his psychology degree at Purdue University. He became a psychological testing specialist at Ft. Holabird in Baltimore, Maryland where he met and married my mother. He then returned with her to the Midwest to finish his degree and start a family. His two years of active duty during the Cold War qualifies him for the American Legion, which therefore qualified me to join the Sons of the American Legion.

Gen 3: Special Agent Fred Steele Bauknight

FBI (1930 – 1967)

My grandfather entered the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) as a clerk in 1930 and became Special Agent Bauknight on the day of his daughter's (my mother's) birth, 11 Oct 1937. He became Assistant Special Agent in Charge in 1943. My mother indicated that during World War II, he monitored German spies in U.S. cities (including New York City) using his wife and young daughter as part of his cover. Due to his service on the home front, he is a qualifying ancestor for the Order of the Second World War.



Gen 4: Private Charles Henry Knight (Pinckney Milton Bauknight)

Army Air Forces (20 Sep 1942 – 1 Apr 1943)

My great-grandfather was accepted for induction during World War II at Jacksonville, Florida and was discharged at Lowry Field, Colorado six months later. He served as a private in the 41st Technical School Squadron of the Army Air Forces. Although he was honorably discharged, his records show that he was “not adaptable for military service.” Nevertheless, his service qualifies for the Order of the Second World War.



Gen 5: Major John Whipple Jr.

Union Army (27 Sep 1861 – 17 Feb 1863)

My great-great-grandfather was commissioned 1st Lieutenant in Company C of the 1st Regiment, Rhode Island Cavalry and worked his way through the ranks to become Full Major. His service at various leadership ranks is mentioned throughout the book “Sabres and Spurs: The First Regiment Rhode Island Cavalry in the Civil War, 1861 – 1865.” He is a qualifying ancestor for the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States.



Gen 6: Captain Joshua Lucas McGahagin

Confederate Army (1864 – 1865)

According to the book, “The Ole Warhorse,” my great-great-grandfather served as captain of the Second Florida Company of Cavalry in General J. J. Dickison's command. He participated in the battles of Horse Landing, Palatka, Waldo, and Gainesville. He fought in several skirmishes with Federal raiders. His service qualifies for the Military Order of the Stars and Bars.



Gen 7: Private William Steele

Virginia Militia (29 Aug 1814 – 30 Nov 1814)

In the book, “The Ancestry of Alyce Steele Cartwright,” my great-great-great-great-grandfather is listed in a letter from the War Department as having rendered service during the War of 1812. He was a private in Captain Samuel Doak’s Company, 5th Regiment, Virginia Militia. His service qualifies for the Society of the War of 1812.

Gen 8: Quarter Master Robert Gilmor

Maryland Militia (10 Feb 1776 – 1778)

My great-great-great-great-great-grandfather was commissioned Quarter Master of the Upper Battalion of Militia in Dorchester County, Maryland on 10 Feb 1776 and served until 1778. His service qualifies for the Sons of the American Revolution.



Gen 9: Captain-Lieutenant Samuel Selden

Continental Army (Jan/Feb 1777 – Jan 1783)

According to “Seldens of Virginia and Allied Families,” my great-great-great-great-great-grandfather served as a Lieutenant in the 1st Virginia Regiment, Cavalry. He was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant on 11 June 1777 and 1st Lieutenant on 18 Nov 1777. He was commissioned Captain-Lieutenant on 25 Jun 1779. He was paid for his services through January 1783. He is a qualifying ancestor for the Sons of the American Revolution.



Gen 10: Colonel George Mason III

Virginia Colony Militia (8 Dec 1715 -?)

According to the book, “The Five George Masons,” my great-great-great-great-great-grandfather was appointed commander in chief of the militia of Stafford County in the Colony of Virginia on 8 Dec 1715. His participation in Lieutenant Governor Spotswood’s 1716 expedition across the Blue Ridge Mountains into the Shenandoah Valley makes him a qualifying ancestor for the National Order of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe.



Gen 11: Colonel William Byrd I

Virginia Colony Militia (1670s – 1680s)

According to the Encyclopedia Virginia, my great-great-great-great-great-great-great-great-grandfather became a captain in the Virginia Colony militia when he was in his twenties. In April or May of 1679, he commanded the defense forces at the falls of the James River. By 1680, he was known as Colonel Byrd in recognition of his commercial and military expertise with the Indians. His service makes him a qualifying ancestor for the Order of Indian Wars of the United States.



Gen 12: Colonel George Mason I

Royalist Army (1651)

Virginia Colony Militia (1670s - 1680s)

My great-great-great-great-great-great-great-great-grandfather commanded a troop of horse in King Charles II's army at the Battle of Worcester on 3 Sep 1651. The army was defeated, and he fled from England to Virginia. He served as Colonel of the Stafford County militia and actively defended his county against the Indians in the 1670s and 1680s. Due to his allegiance to King Charles II, he is a qualifying ancestor for the Order of Descendants of Colonial Cavaliers.

I arranged the insignia for each hereditary society in a display case for my son. The insignia are arranged in the shape of an "A" as part of a series of three display cases that spell "SAM." My wife took a photograph of the display case and labeled the photograph to show the generation number, name, service, and corresponding society for each generation. As a result, my son has a visual reminder of our long family history of service. I hope that this "Twelve Generations of Service" display case inspires you to consider how you might use hereditary society insignia to communicate your family history of service to your children.

FROM MERCIA, OLD ENGLAND TO NEW ENGLAND

Mercia (Old English: *Miercna rīce*; Latin: *Merciorum regnum*) was one of the kingdoms of the Anglo-Saxon Heptarchy. The name is a Latinization of the Old English *Mierce* or *Myrce* (West Saxon dialect; *Merce* in the Mercian dialect itself), meaning "border people" (see March). Mercia dominated what would later become England for three centuries, subsequently going into a gradual decline while Wessex eventually conquered and united all the kingdoms into the Kingdom of England.

The kingdom was centered on the valley of the River Trent and its tributaries, in the region now known as the English Midlands. The kingdom did not have a single capital as such. In times before a sizable civil service the 'capital' was effectively wherever the king was at any given time. Early in its existence Repton seems to have been the location of an important royal estate. According to the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, it was from Repton in 873–4 that the Great Heathen Army deposed the King of Mercia. Slightly earlier, King Offa seems to have favored Tamworth. It was there where he was crowned and spent many a Christmas.

For 300 years (between 600 and 900), having annexed or gained submissions from five of the other six kingdoms of the Heptarchy (East Anglia, Essex, Kent, Sussex and Wessex), Mercia dominated England south of the River Humber: this period is known as the Mercian Supremacy. The reign of King Offa, who is best remembered for his Dyke that designated the boundary between Mercia and the Welsh kingdoms, is sometimes known as the "Golden Age of Mercia". Nicholas Brooks noted that "the Mercians stand out as by far the most successful of the various early Anglo-Saxon peoples until the later ninth century", and some historians, such as Sir Frank Stenton, believe the unification of England south of the Humber estuary was achieved during the reign of Offa.

Mercia was a pagan kingdom; King Peada converted to Christianity around 656, and Christianity was firmly established in the kingdom by the late 7th century. The Diocese of Mercia was founded in 656, with the first bishop, Diuma, based at Repton. After 13 years at Repton, in 669 the fifth bishop, Saint Chad, moved the bishopric to Lichfield, where it has been based since. In 691, the Diocese of Mercia became the Diocese of Lichfield. For a brief period between 787 and 799 the diocese was an archbishopric, although it was dissolved in 803. The current bishop, Michael Ipgrave, is the 99th since the diocese was established.

At the end of the 9th century, following the invasions of the Vikings and their Great Heathen Army, much of the former Mercian territory was absorbed into the Danelaw. At its height, the Danelaw included London, all East Anglia and most of the North of England.

The final Mercian king, Ceolwulf II, died in 879; the kingdom appears to have thereby lost its political independence. Initially, it was ruled by a lord or ealdorman under the overlordship of Alfred the Great, who styled himself "King of the Anglo-Saxons". The kingdom had a brief period of independence in the mid-10th century, and again very briefly in 1016; however, by this time, it was viewed as a province within the Kingdom of England, not an independent kingdom.^a

It was during this time that Leofric was an Earl of Mercia and his wife was Godgifu, late Anglo-Saxon noblewoman. The couple had nine children; one of the sons was Aelfgar.

It is through this son that we are direct descendants of Earl Leofric and his wife Godgifu, "Lady Godiva".

I have been particularly blessed with a very rich heritage and can proudly claim that I have six "gateway ancestors" through whom I can claim direct descendancy from Leofric the Earl of Mercia and his wife "our Lady Countess of Mercia".

The Lineages of the below sketches, from the Gateway Ancestor to our Lady Countess of Mercia, have been taken from Douglas Richardson "Royal Ancestry: A Study in Colonial and Medieval Families" (Salt Lake City, Kimball G Everingham, editor 2013) v:1-5; and Frederick Lewis Weis "Ancestral Roots of Certain American Colonists who Came to America before 1700" (Baltimore, Genealogical Publishing Co., 2008) 8th ed.

Audrey Barlow was born about 1600-1603, the daughter of Stafford Barlow, Gent., of Narborough and Lutterworth, Leicestershire. She married by license dated 17 July 1626 William Almy (or Almey). Gent., of South Kilworth, Leicestershire, son, and heir of Christopher Almy, of South Kilworth, Leicestershire. He and his wife Audrey, and their two children, Annis and Christopher, immigrated to New England in 1635 on the ship, *Abigail*. They settled initially at Lynn, Massachusetts, but in 1637, they removed to Sandwich, Massachusetts. In 1642, they removed to Portsmouth, Rhode Island.

Jeremy (or Jeremiah) Clarke, baptized at East Farleigh, Kent 1 December 1605 was the son of William Clerke and Mary Weston. He married about 1637 Frances Latham, widow of William Dungan, of St. Martin in the Fields, Middlesex, and daughter of Lewis Latham, Gent, of Elstow, Bedfordshire, Sergeant Falconer to King Charles I, by his first wife, Elizabeth. Frances was baptized at Kempston, Bedfordshire 15 February 1609-1610. They had five sons including Walter, Governor of Rhode Island and two daughters, including Mary, wife of Governor John Cranston of Rhode Island, and Sarah, wife of Rhode Island Governor Caleb Carr. Jeremy and his family immigrated to New England before 1638, in which year he was admitted an inhabitant of the island of Aquidneck, later Newport, Rhode Island.

Frances Deighton, daughter of John Deighton and Jane Bassett, was baptized at St. Nicholas, Gloucester on 1 March 1611-1612. She married at Great Witcombe, Gloucestershire 11 February 1632-1633 Richard Williams, who was baptized at Wotton under Edge, Gloucestershire 28 Jan 1607-1608. They had six sons and three daughters. He and his family immigrated to New England about 1636-1637, where they settled at Taunton, Massachusetts.





The Miniature Insignia may be worn by all members with a 4" long, 3/4" wide purple satin ribbon at official meetings. It may also be worn as a lapel pin, pendant, or attached to a branch or a charm bracelet, at official meetings and elsewhere, by all members. The Large Insignia may be worn by all members, at official meetings and elsewhere, as a necklace on a chain or as a lapel pin. A 30" long, 2 1/2" wide purple satin ribbon is available for officers, council members, founding members and charter members, for wearing at official meetings.
